### From the Minister...

## What does it mean to be "A Community of Presence"

Spiritually, presence can mean two radically different things. One the one hand, contemplatives talk of "being present." Presence from this perspective is all about awareness and remembering to "live in the moment." On the other hand, theologians tend to come at presence from the perspective of "otherness." Their concern is not just that we pay attention to the present moment, but that we notice a transcendent Presence that is woven through all moments.

In some ways it is a commonplace that we humans get distracted easily, more especially in these modern times. Life in our society has grown a lot more complicated and there are far more "things" to distract us – not to mention the pervasive electronics, television channels, 24-hour news and politics and on and on. Really paying attention to any one thing is getting harder and harder; the mental demands of contemporary life are taxing and distracting.

I once did an exercise in being present in one place for a brief period of time. We were told to find a three square foot spot outside where we could spend 20 minutes just looking, concentrating on what we found in that tiny stretch of the vast earth. The first thing I found were dead leaves, and I got to thinking that after all this was a stupid place for me to have chosen to sit – lovely material for composting and enabling the development of life later, but hardly an ideal spot for watching life at present. Then, as I simply concentrated my attention, my three square feet began to come alive. There were, of course, the ants, scurrying about on their urgent business. Then there appeared – or rather, I finally noticed – a tiny green caterpillar, slowly, so slowly inching her way up a leaf. I watched closely but only noticed that she had moved when I looked away and then back again. There were mosquitoes, but they proved to be quite easy to shoo away. There were also, of course, all of the sounds of the woods on whose edge I sat. Suddenly this seemingly dead spot was alive with life and sound from all around me.

That little practice of being present awoke in me that fleeting sense of wonder in the Presence of all of this life around me; not the divine, exactly, but the awesomeness of being part of this extraordinary amplitude of life and being and all that was around me. It was at least a momentary awakening to how small a part I am – and how embedded I am – in this "Interdependent Web of all Existence of which we are a (small) part.," as our Seventh Principle puts it.

Being present to another person has some of the same qualities. When we are really present to another person there comes to be a shared Presence between us, something more than each of us separately, a sacred presence, if you will. I was having dinner recently with a friend whose husband died about six months ago. Both of us told stories about regrets we had over not being quite fully present to ourselves and to our partners as they neared the end of their lives. We found ourselves distracted by little things – the momentum of the medical system, the need to arrange something for other friends, or just being ever so tired after months and even years of caring for our partners. Those lapses of attention were among the things we most regretted; not because we felt guilty, exactly, but because we could have been more whole if we had been more attentive. But we all fall short; we are, after all, only human. And we can all be more attentive to being present now.

As Mary Oliver puts it, "This is the first, the wildest and the wisest thing I know: that the soul exists and is built entirely out of attentiveness."

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## **Worship Services in December**

The theme of the month is Presence.

<u>December 4</u>: Worship with Rev. Paul Sprecher: "Paying Attention" - In the stories of the birth of Jesus, we find that various participants in the story we tell at our Christmas Eve Eve service notice the presence of something out of the ordinary, and they pay attention. The shepherds notice the angels, the wise men notice the star, and both Mary and Joseph listen to an angel. In our more skeptical age, these "signs" would probably be ignored or taken as signs of mental instability. Are there still places to pay attention to the sacred in our own lives?

<u>December 11</u>: Worship with Rev. Paul Sprecher: "Real Presents" - It's a commonplace that we go overboard in giving gifts and that we are encouraged to do so by many pressures from our culture. But who wants to be a Scrooge? Or is there another way?

<u>December 18</u>: Worship with Worship & Religious Education Committees: "Solstice: Growing Our Light" - An intergenerational service to honor the return of the Sun - one of many Festivals of Light during this season (including Hanukkah) - and celebrate coming out of darkness into the light. We will explore how we can use this time to grow the light in our personal and spiritual lives, as well as the united life of our nation.

<u>December 23</u>: Worship with Rev. Paul Sprecher on Christmas Eve Eve (7:30 pm) - Our traditional service of stories and carols -- on the occasion of our First Parish 300th birthday.

The Worship Committee decided not to hold a service on Sunday, Christmas morning. However, we will be holding a service on New Year's Day, which also falls on a Sunday.

# ~AN ANNOUNCEMENT~ FIRST PARISH - BSU/Maxwell Library ARCHIVAL PROJECT

To celebrate the collaboration with BSU to preserve First Parish history

As our 300<sup>th</sup> Anniversary approached attention was drawn to First Parish records that have been retained over the years. It soon became apparent, that except for a few items stored in a safe deposit box, most of what we had was stored under totally inadequate conditions. Worse still, while a lot of material survived, much more had been lost over the years.

Something had to be done to preserve our history for posterity. At first simple improvement in storage was considered, but we lacked the necessary space and funds to deal with temperature, humidity and safety concerns. Nor did we have a way to allow access to the materials for research.

We became aware that the Maxwell Library at Bridgewater State University had significant archival storage capability that might be available to us. A number of exploratory meetings were held with the library and a plan emerged.

In October 2016, the Parish Committee signed an agreement with the Maxwell Library to place our archival material on long term loan to their Archives and Special Collections. The library has agreed to store our material in a secure climate controlled environment, to catalogue the content, to cover the cost of any supplies needed for proper storage, and to allow access for research purposes. Most of our archival records have already been moved to Maxwell Library and the remainder will be by the end of the year. (Contact David Tedesco if you would like a copy of the loan agreement between First Parish and Maxwell Library.)

To celebrate the First Parish - BSU Archival Project, BSU will host a reception at the Maxwell Library on March 15<sup>th</sup>, starting at 6 PM. **All members and friends of First Parish are invited to attend this event which will be an important part of our 300<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration**.

## WANT YOUR HOME TO BECOME GREEN AND SAVE MONEY?

#### 10 Ideas to Turn a Home into a Green Machine

- 1. Get a high-efficiency showerhead saves up to 3,000 gallons per person, per year.
- 2. Recycle water in your bathroom use devices that allow you to reuse sink water for flushing your toilet.
- 3. Compost reduces trash production and provides rich compost for spring planting.
- 4. Buy green power from your utility this shows utility executives and government officials we need more investment in renewable-energy projects.
- 5. Improve the efficiency of your existing hot-water heater reduce the temperature of your water heater to 120 degrees and wrap it in a water-heater blanket.
- 6. Use high-efficiency outdoor lighting replace floodlights with CFL or LED versions and install motion sensors.
- 7. Replace high-use indoor lights with compact fluorescents or LED's.
- 8. Run washing machines and dishwashers only when full (or adjusting the water setting) whenever possible.
- Drive smarter keep tires inflated, drive the speed limit, make sure filters are clean, step on gas & brakes carefully.

#### SOCIAL JUSTICE IN THE NEWS – Ideas and Actions from UU Mass Action

#### The Safety Pin Movement:

The Safety Pin Movement began in the UK as a way for people to demonstrate solidarity with those in the immigrant community. It's a way to signal to anyone being threatened or who might feel threatened that you are a person they can turn to for support. The symbol has gained popularity in the U.S. in the days since Trump's election. We will have a small basket of safety pins available during coffee hour for volunteers to take to wear on their clothing.

We need to be prepared to protect those who are vulnerable among us, particularly someone being harassed in a public setting. The process is called de-escalation. There two main strategies: (a) Sitting or standing alongside the person being harassed, talking to calm and comfort them – ignoring the harasser; or (b) talking directly to the harasser and defusing the situation. I would recommend the first as easier for beginners, requiring little training or practice.

Alternative (a): Sit or stand by the victim of harassment, start talking to them about a safe subject ("What movie have you seen lately?") and ignore the harasser. Ideally, the harasser will back off. If not, help the victim move away to a safer location and stay with them until it's okay to move on. The second alternative – confronting the harasser directly – is trickier. To get a better understanding of this strategy, I recommend seeing an on-line video by **Standing on the Side of Love** director Caitlin Breedlove. This 21 minute video gives a good introduction on the technique of de-escalation. #### **Criminal Justice Reform:**

Rally & Press Conference: Jobs Not Jails When: Tuesday, Dec. 13 at 10 a.m.

Where: 140 Bowdoin St, Church of the New Jerusalem (across from the State House, on the side)

The Governor, Speaker, Senate President, and Chief Justice will JOINTLY file a bill in mid-January on criminal justice reform. It will include of the recommendations of a report the Council of State Governments (CSG) will publish on the criminal justice system in Massachusetts that will be released when their bill is filed.

- A. Good News This elevates criminal justice reform to being a "must pass" bill situation given the 4 major state leaders are behind it... the Governor, Senate President, House Speaker and Chief Justice.
- B. BUT THE CHALLENGE: The bill they file will very likely NOT be comprehensive enough and will likely focus on the "back end" of the system on probation, parole, and some aspects of recidivism, but NOT on the "front end" of the system like repealing long mandatory minimum sentences on non-violent drug offenders, etc.

To meet this challenge of getting a stronger bill passed than the one the 4 State Leaders will likely file, we are taking these actions that you can help with...

- 1. Attend the Rally/Press Conference on December 13 at 10 a.m. Jobs Not Jails will have a rally/press conference to call on the 4 state leaders to include the 6 proposals of the JNJ Coalition.
- 2. Contact your legislators and/or come to the JNJ Lobby Day in January ask that they co-sponsor the omnibus criminal justice reform bill, The Justice Reinvestment Act, which will include the JNJ Priorities. (more details to come on this the filing deadline is Jan. 20<sup>th</sup>).
- 3. In March 2017, the coalition will be organizing 6 or more major public action meetings in Boston, Brockton, New Bedford, Worcester, Springfield, Lynn and Lowell to show large scale public support for criminal justice reform and to engage legislators, mayors, sheriffs, police chiefs in standing with us.

The First Parish Social Justice Committee will keep you informed about future developments, particularly what's happening in Brockton and Boston.

#### Minister's Discretionary Fund -


